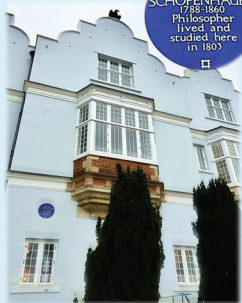
ENGLISH HERITAGE

1 BLYTON, ENID



- One of the best-selling English-language author of the 20th Century, selling more than 600 million copies
- Her most famous works: *The Famous Five*, *Noddy Goes to Toyland*, *The Secret Seven*, *The Faraway Tree*, and *Malory Towers* was depicted as a set of British postage stamps



2 BESTALL, ALFRED



- Awarded the MBE in 1985
- Wrote and illustrated at least 273 Rupert stories
- The author and illustrator of Rupert Bear
- His most famous works: Book - *Rupert Bear, Bill Badger, Algy Pug, Podgy Pig*



3 GRAVES, ROBERT



- Gold medal of the National Poetry Society of America in 1960
- Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry in 1968
- Gold medal for Poetry in Cultural Olympics in 1968
- His most famous works: Book - *The Golden Fleece, Seven Days in New Crete, The Crowning Privilege, Oxford Addresses on Poetry*



4 BUTLER, JOSEPHINE



- Renowned for her work with prostitutes
- Led the movement to end the regulation of prostitution in India
- Requested Cambridge University to provide examinations for women in 1868
- Her most famous works: Book - *The Education and Employment of Women, Woman's Work and Woman's Culture*





5 CHAIN, SIR ERNST



- Awarded Nobel Prize along with Florey and Fleming for Physiology or Medicine for penicillin in 1945
- Silver Berzelius Medal of the Swedish Medical Society in 1946
- Awarded the Paul Ehrlich Centenary Prize in 1954
- The Imperial College London biochemistry building is named after him



6 TOYNBEE, ARNOLD & TOYNBEE, JOSEPH



- Joseph was an ear surgeon, he invented the artificial tympanic membrane in 1853 and published it in the book - *On the Use of Artificial Membrana tympani in Cases of Deafness*
- Developed the *Botanical specimens* which are now in the Kew Garden's collection
- His second son, Arnold shared his interest in social welfare and dedicated his short life to it



7 SCHOPENHAUER, ARTHUR



- He claimed "Human desire was futile, illogical, directionless, and, by extension, so was all human action in the world". Einstein paraphrased his views as: "Man can indeed do what he wants, but he cannot will what he wants."
- His most famous work: Book - *The World as Will and Representation*



8 HEYER, GEORGETTE



- Well-known for her romance novels set in the 18th century and English Regency period
- Became a global publishing phenomenon in 1868, selling a million copies in a year in Britain
- Still 51 of her 56 published novels remain in print today
- Her most famous work: Book - *Devil's Cub, Friday's Child, The Grand Sophy, Frederica*
